Diplomat's world extends greetings to all its esteemed readers. The month of October has been an eventful month with a number of important national and international interests to readers.

This month President Putin joined the ceremony from Moscow through a video link with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina commissioning the Rooppur Nuclear power plant, making Bangladesh the 33rd Nation to join the nuclear club, a symbol of strong bilateral ties between Dhaka and Moscow. Bangladesh has established an independent Atomic Energy Regulatory Authority to ensure safety by maintaining close liaison with the IAEA.

Also this month, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina inaugurated three mega projects, a world-class, third terminal of the Hazrat Shajalal International Airport Dhaka. The new Terminal will provide facilities for 37 aircrafts, 26 boarding bridges along with 115 check-in automated passport control. The Prime Minister also opened the Dhaka-Bhanga railway over Padma Bridge which is another milestone in the country's infrastructure development. The opening of the 82-kilometer railway track from Dhaka to Faridpur "Padma Bridge Rail Link Project", fulfills the long-cherished dream of the people of the country's southeastern district. Moreover, the commissioning of the 9.32 km Bangabandhu tunnel under the Karnaphuli river connecting two major towns, jointly financed by Bangladesh and China. A remarkable engineering feat that will increase trade between Bangladesh, India, and Myanmar.

This month an iconic film on the father of the Nation Sheikh Mujibur Rahman. "Mujib: Making of a Nation" was released throughout Bangladesh and India. It was well received by viewers all over Bangladesh and India, highlighting the liberation war and the victory of Bangladesh. The film was produced jointly by Bangladesh and India by acclaimed Indian film director Ahayam Benegal and renowned music director Shantanu Moitra.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina accompanied by Foreign Minister Dr. Abdul Momen visited Brussels later this month at the invitation of the European Commission President to attend the first Global Gateway Forum. This is the EU's response to mobilize funds for infrastructure projects in developing countries. During her stay, the Prime Minister met leaders and discussed matters of mutual interest. This will be a big support for Bangladesh's ongoing development projects. A loan support arrangement of 300 million Euros was signed for the renewable energy sector.

BANGABANDHU TUNNEL: DRIVING BANGLADESH'S ECONOMIC RENAISSANCE

n October 28, 2023, a historic moment unfolded in Bangladesh as Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina inaugurated the Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman Tunnel (BSMRT), marking the launch of South Asia's first underwater expressway tunnel. This engineering marvel is set to usher in a new era in communication in Bangladesh, promising far-reaching impacts on the country's economy, connectivity, and industrial growth.

The Bangabandhu Tunnel, named in honor of Bangladesh's founding leader Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, is a remarkable infrastructure project situated at the mouth of the Karnaphuli River in Chattogram city. This 9.3-kilometer-long tunnel is a testament to modern

engineering and construction capabilities, representing the first large-diameter underwater tunnel undertaken by a Chinese company overseas. It was constructed under the stewardship of China **Communications Construction** Company (CCCC), setting new standards in tunnel engineering.

The project presented significant technical challenges, particularly concerning the complex geological structures surrounding the tunnel's location. To overcome these challenges, the project team adopted innovative solutions, including the use of the world's largest steel casing. This casing allowed specialized machinery to access the tunnel's interior, enabling the successful execution of the project. The Bangabandhu Tunnel was

designed to Chinese standards, constructed using Chinese equipment, and managed by Chinese enterprises, showcasing the culmination of China's expertise in tunnel construction overseas.

The significance of the Bangabandhu Tunnel extends beyond its engineering prowess. It is a pivotal component of the broader

Bangladesh-China-India-Myanma r Economic Corridor and a key contributor to the Belt and Road Initiative. Its role in enhancing transportation conditions in Chattogram and driving economic development in Bangladesh cannot be overstated.

Beyond its engineering marvel, the Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman Tunnel holds the promise of unlocking

Bangladesh's economic potential on a grand scale. The tunnel is expected to have a significant impact on several key economic sectors and further enhance the country's position in the region.

The tunnel seamlessly connects the Matarbari Deep Sea Port, Chattogram Port, Bay Terminal, and the Mirsarai Economic Zone. This strategic linkage of ports and economic zones has far-reaching implications. The Matarbari Deep Sea Port, currently under construction, and a seaport jetty at the Mirsharai economic zone area are set to be connected through the tunnel by 2025 and 2026,

respectively. As a result, thousands of factories on the north side of the tunnel have already attracted more investments. The under-construction Bay Terminal, situated next to the tunnel, is expected to open in 2025 and will handle as much goods as the Chattogram Port. The tunnel's contribution to streamlining port operations and reducing transportation costs is expected to have a profound impact on trade and commerce, both nationally and internationally.

The establishment of the Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Shilpa Nagar in Mirsharai, covering a vast expanse of 33,805 acres, is a significant development. This industrial zone, which is approximately 10 kilometers from the Dhaka-Chattogram highway and 65 kilometers from the port city, is set to be connected to the tunnel through a marine drive along the coast. This connection is expected to save both time and money, expediting industrialization in the area.

Data from the Bangladesh Export **Processing Zone Authority** (BEPZA) reveal that numerous companies have already leased land in this zone. These businesses have invested substantial amounts, creating jobs for tens of thousands of people. As more plots are allocated to investors in the zone, it is anticipated that full operations will result in the creation of over 1.5 million jobs. The economic growth associated with this industrial corridor will have a profound impact on the local and national economies.

The Bangabandhu Tunnel is not only a domestic game-changer but also a significant player in boosting international trade. The tunnel's role in improving the Asian Highway Network is expected to strengthen connectivity between Bangladesh and neighboring countries. It positions the country as a key player in the region's trade dynamics, facilitating the transit of goods not only within Bangladesh but also with India, Nepal, Myanmar, and beyond. Besides its economic significance, the tunnel is poised to boost tourism in the region. As connectivity improves, the scenic

beauty and cultural heritage of Southern Chattogram become more accessible to tourists. This development will have a positive impact on local businesses, employment, and overall regional development.

Experts stress the importance of the speedy implementation of the 230-kilometer marine drive project to maximize the tunnel's utilization. This project is considered crucial to unlock the full potential of the tunnel. Through the marine drive, the efficient use of the Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Shilpa Nagar, Matarbari Deep Sea Port, and the entire region from Mirsharai to Cox's Bazar is expected to develop as an economic corridor. While the tunnel's loan repayment is set to begin in 2025, it may not be possible to cover installments with its income alone in the initial years. The full benefits of the tunnel will be reaped when these industrial zones are fully operational.

The Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman Tunnel is more than just an engineering marvel; it's a symbol of Bangladesh's vision for economic progress,

regional connectivity, and international trade. As it opens to the public, it represents a significant step toward transforming the nation's economic landscape and positioning Bangladesh as a key player in the region's economic development.

The tunnel is set to become a catalyst for industrial growth, particularly in Chattogram's southeastern region. By connecting key economic corridors on its two sides, such as the Dhaka-Chattogram and Chattogram-Cox's Bazar highways, it creates the foundation for what experts

describe as the country's largest industrial corridor, stretching from Mirsrai to Cox's Bazar. This growth is expected to attract local and foreign investments, leading to the establishment of numerous factories and industrial facilities in the region.

Prominent companies like Akij Group, Four H Group, Diamond Cement, S Alam Group, and Partex Group have already secured real estate for new factories, spanning various sectors, including power, petroleum, apparel, shipbuilding, fish processing, steel, cement, and oil refinery. The Unitex Group is investing in a chemical factory that will generate employment for 500 people. The Mostafa Hakim Group has launched a steel factory and an oxygen plant, employing around 2,000 workers. The tunnel's opening has led to a surge in interest from countries like Japan to invest in Chattogram, focusing on industries such as shipbuilding, chemicals, electronics, and furniture. This industrial growth is expected to boost local employment, trade, and overall economic prosperity.

The Bangabandhu Tunnel not only connects two regions of Bangladesh but also plays a crucial role in improving the Asian Highway Network and enhancing connectivity with neighboring countries. It facilitates seamless transit of goods between Bangladesh, India, Nepal, and Myanmar. This improved connectivity is set to increase local and foreign investment in Chattogram, thereby driving trade and investments in the region. Moreover, it is expected to serve as a golden gateway for the country's industrialization.

The tunnel's impact extends to the real estate and housing sectors, as businesses and industries expand in Southern Chattogram. Approximately 100 companies have acquired real estate near the tunnel, with some already constructing factories

and others planning to embark on projects that will reshape South Chattogram. Multi-storied buildings and rental properties are becoming increasingly available, creating opportunities for the housing sector. CPDL, a housing sector company in Chattogram, is planning a satellite city under its subsidiary CPDL Neer, indicating a growing demand for housing in the region. Companies like the Albion Group are strategically positioning themselves to supply raw materials to industries in the South, further stimulating economic activities.

Business leaders and economists emphasize the need for the development of the Dhaka-Chattogram highway and high-load capacity roads. They recommend the construction of an eight-lane international-standard

Dhaka-Chattogram highway to fully realize the benefits of executed megaprojects like the Bangabandhu Tunnel. Cost-effective logistics and infrastructure projects are essential to maximize the tunnel's advantages, and experts recommend raising vehicle load limits to reduce logistics expenses. Stakeholders stress the importance of a comprehensive master plan for future urbanization in South Chattogram, covering Anwara and Karnaphuli upazilas. Such a master plan is deemed essential to maximize the impact of the new township in the South, which is expected to benefit from its proximity to the tunnel.

The Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman Tunnel stands as a testament to modern engineering and international collaboration. It is set to play a pivotal role in transforming Chattogram into a logistics hub and driving economic growth across various sectors. With its potential to revolutionize the region's infrastructure, connectivity, and industrial landscape, this engineering marvel is indeed a beacon of progress for Bangladesh and a symbol of the country's commitment to economic development. As the tunnel opens to the public, it marks the beginning of a new era for Bangladesh's economic future.

OUR FREEDOM-FIGHTER DIPLOMATS

Tt is time to recall the brave men who carried the torch for the future in 1971. Among those men who reassured us, despite all the uncertainty associated with a war we never sought but were burdened with by Pakistan, were K.M. Shehabuddin and Amjadul Haq. They were young, they were junior diplomats at the Pakistan High Commission in Delhi when the Pakistan occupation army launched its genocide in what was then East Pakistan. Neither they nor the seventy-five million people of Bangladesh knew at the time if

or when Bangladesh would become a free state. And yet Shehabuddin and Haq did the unimaginable: they repudiated Pakistan on 6 April 1971.

Go back in time. Your sense of history will inform you that when Shehabuddin and Haq revolted, the Mujibnagar government-in-exile had not yet taken shape. No one knew where Tajuddin Ahmad was at that point. There was simply no trace of Syed Nazrul Islam or Mansoor Ali or A.H.M Quamruzzaman. For that matter, the world did not know if Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman had made his way out of Dhaka or had been abducted by the Pakistan army. At a time when reports of widespread atrocities in Bangladesh were filtering out to the outside world, it was quite possible that Bangabandhu was dead, at the hands of the Pakistan army.

Today, therefore, it is our moral responsibility to salute K.M. Shehabuddin and Amjadul Haq for the sheer bravery they demonstrated in early April 1971. Their act opened a window. They informed the world that Bangladesh, even as it waited for its sovereign

parameters to take shape, was preparing to go on a diplomatic offensive. That battle was carried many miles further when Hossain Ali, Pakistan's deputy high commissioner in Calcutta, turned his back on Pakistan on 18 April, a day after the formation of the Mujibnagar government, and with 65 Bengali officers and employees of the

mission, switched allegiance to Bangladesh. Fifty-two years on, it is our singular pride to recall that seminal moment when Hossain Ali formally hoisted the Bangladesh flag in Calcutta and proceeded forth along the route set on 6 April by Shehabuddin and Amjadul Haq.

All these years after what was truly a momentous year for us, it is time to enlighten the young as it is time to remind those of our generation suffering from selective amnesia of the superhuman efforts expended by Bengali warriors on various fronts in highlighting the national struggle for freedom before the world. Bengali diplomats played a pivotal role in that struggle. You admire their sense of patriotism. More than that, you keep reminding yourself of the grave risks they put themselves and their families to by rejecting the state of Pakistan at a time when none of us was sure when freedom would dawn or if it

would dawn at all. Their larger families were in the occupied land --- parents, siblings and others --- and could easily be put through horrible suffering by Pakistan's soldiers. Human frailties are natural. All too often, it is the probable consequences of our actions

which stay our hand. And we do not go forth into the region of the unknown.

But these brave Bengali diplomats plunged into the dark in their sheer belief that at the end of it all there surely was light somewhere. As Pakistan's

vice consul in New York, A.H. Mahmood Ali could have held himself back from going over to Bangladesh. He did not do that. On 25 April, he quit the Pakistan foreign service and allied himself with the Bangladesh cause. Do not forget that Ali, Shehabuddin, Haq and Hossain Ali were all young. Note too the idealism in them, the same that spurred A.M.A. Muhith, economic counsellor at Pakistan's embassy in Washington, into rebellion against Pakistan on 30 June. When men like Muhith spurned Pakistan, the world paid attention. And, yes, the world paid greater attention when, on 1 August, Mohiuddin Ahmed, then with the Pakistan high commission in London, delivered a riveting speech at Trafalgar Square to tell people around the world why Bangladesh was waging war to be free.

K.M. Shehabuddin, having performed well as Bangladesh's diplomat at various critical points on the globe, did a fine job of recording the history of our diplomatic struggle for freedom in 1971. If you have not gone through There and Back Again: A Diplomat's Tale (published by The University Press in 2006), it is time you did. For it speaks of the calculated dangers men like Abul Fateh, Pakistan's ambassador in Iraq, plunged into through their rejection of Pakistan. Fateh went over to Bangladesh on 21 August. Ten days earlier the Pakistani junta had placed Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman on trial in camera before a military tribunal. M.M. Rezaul Karim, who would in January 1972 receive a free Bangabandhu in

London, declared his solidarity with Bangladesh on 7 October.

One of the more momentous happenings in the fledgling country's diplomacy occurred on 4 August when Enayet Karim, Shah A.M.S. Kibria, Abu Rushd Matinuddin, Sved Muazzem Ali, Ataur Rahman Chowdhury, A.M. Sharful Alam and Sheikh Rustam Ali walked out of the Pakistan mission in Washington and joined the Bangladesh movement. S.A. Karim left Pakistan's UN mission and strode over to Bangladesh. On 14 September, K.K. Panni, ambassador to the Philippines, repudiated Pakistan. Pakistan's ambassador to Argentina, Abdul Momin, followed suit about a month later, on 11 October. On 3 October, Mustafizur Rahman deserted Pakistan's mission in Kathmandu; Humayun Rashid Chowdhury, based in Delhi, went over to the Bangladesh camp on 4 October. Waliur Rahman did so on 2 November.

These men blazed a trail . . . in all-encompassing darkness. ***

INDONESIA CELEBRATES ITS 78TH INDEPENDENCE DAY IN DHAKA, STRENGTHENING TIES WITH BANGLADESH

THE BEST KEPT SECRETS ARE HIDDEN IN PLAIN SIGHT

he Commonwealth, with its 56 member states and 2.5 billion citizens, plays host to some of the world's most dynamic emerging economies and is the source of a large chunk of the world's foreign direct investment.

Commonwealth member states enjoy 21% lower bilateral trading costs with one another - a quantitative benefit termed 'the Commonwealth Advantage' -, and already trade disproportionately more with one another. Despite all of this, the bloc is all-too-often overlooked by those too busy fixating on more traditional partnerships. And this isn't just theory. The Commonwealth Enterprise and Investment Council (CWEIC), the organisation that I lead as Chairman, is putting these ideas into practice. CWEIC operates across the Commonwealth to strengthen trade and investment links between its fifty-six

member states. We work alongside 150 Strategic Partners in business and government to build connections and unlock investment opportunities.

The recent Commonwealth Trade and Investment Forum (CTIF), held this September in Dhaka,

showcased just how powerful the pull of the Commonwealth can be. Organised by CWEIC in partnership with the Bangladesh Investment Development Authority, the Bangladesh Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and the ZI Foundation, CTIF brought together more than 300 delegates from 30 Commonwealth countries for two days of meetings, panels, and networking. I also want

to pay particular thanks to Mr Zillur Hussain MBE, whose support in putting CTIF together was invaluable.

The proceedings were formally opened by Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, who highlighted her commitment to the Commonwealth, emphasising the need for greater investment to accelerate the country's economic progress.

Bangladesh is a fantastic example of the Commonwealth's potential with an average growth rate of 6.4% over the past five years, it is projected to be one of the world's largest exporters in the decades to come and is on track to become a \$1 trillion economy by 2040.

Through its membership of the Commonwealth, Bangladesh can open up new markets for its garments in fast-growing Africa, while seeking investment from trusted partners like Britain, Singapore, and India.

I was also particularly delighted to receive such strong support from Dr. A.K. Abdul Momen, Foreign Minister of Bangladesh, who hosted a roundtable meeting with a delegation of African business leaders and ministers. This was not just a fantastic opportunity to highlight the potential for closer ties between Bangladesh and Africa; it was also an example of how the Commonwealth can draw together broad, diverse groups of

states with more in common than they might at first assume.

However, it wasn't just about forging new connections and showcasing the progress of one of the Commonwealth's most impressive economies; the Commonwealth business community is also key to facing up to the challenge of climate change, which is at the top of the agenda for many of the Commonwealth's vulnerable member states.

During the opening ceremony, we saw the presentation of the 'Commonwealth-Bangladesh Bangabandhu Green Investment Award', which rewards sustainable and environmentally friendly investments. The winner, Eco Brixs, based in Uganda, is just one example of how private sector innovation can help us to meet the challenge of transitioning towards a more sustainable economy.

The Forum also coincided with the launch of our new Hub Office

in Dhaka, which we inaugurated with Salman F Rahman, the Prime Minister's Advisor for Private Industry and Investment. The launch of our Bangladesh Hub follows on from the launch of two new Hubs early this year, in Singapore and Cameroon, marking an expansion in our network of in-country Hubs which allow us to communicate so effectively with partners on the ground.

The work doesn't stop there. In November, CWEIC will host the Commonwealth Trade and Investment Summit in London, bringing together Heads of Government, senior Ministers and international business leaders from across our network for a two-day conference. The 2023 Summit programme will focus on the key economic challenges and opportunities facing the Commonwealth this year and identify areas in which the Commonwealth can help finance emerging markets, engage in sustainable business practices, and strengthen collaboration between the public and private sector.

Next year, we will host the biannual Commonwealth Business Forum in Samoa, which will run alongside the Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting. Following on from the success of CBF 2022 in Kigali, the Forum is the high-point our calendar, and will serve as the ultimate rallying-point for the Commonwealth business community. With climate change no doubt high on the agenda, particularly given that

this year's CHOGM will take place in a small island state, we'll no doubt be focusing on the role that the private sector can play in a changing global landscape.

These two landmark events, alongside a busy calendar of missions, visits, and forums, are living proof of global interest in the Commonwealth's potential.

The lesson here is twofold. First, countries - including Britain should look to the Commonwealth as a platform for trade and investment, which will only grow in importance in the years to come. Partners like Bangladesh, long overlooked, are due for reconsideration.

Second, those looking to define the Commonwealth's modern purpose need look no further. Much ink has been spilled about what now unites the Commonwealth, but CWEIC's example - already working in practice - shows that the tradition of free enterprise is a

powerful binding agent for this expansive bloc.

As the emerging economies of Africa and Asia continue to grow in importance, membership of the Commonwealth will only become more valuable. Already, countries are queuing up to join, with two new members admitted as recently as 2022 - they see membership of the Commonwealth as a way to access the Anglophone world of commerce and investment,

opening up new markets in all manner of places. They also recognise that in a world of rising protectionism, the Commonwealth is one of the only blocs which still recognises the value of grassroots economic development through trade, commerce, and investment.

Seizing on these opportunities now, laying the groundwork for a diverse and growing range of partners, could be a boon for

cash-strapped Britain. It can also provide an additional boost to the rapid development of emerging economies, opening up new markets and enabling them to forge new partnerships.

The question is not whether the Commonwealth will grow in importance in the years to come, but whether politicians and officials can keep up with the work that the private sector is already doing to supercharge this great global network.



ROOPPUR NPP: SAFE AND STABLE

t is no secret that Rooppur NPP is the epitome of the friendly relations between Russia and Bangladesh. Our ties are deeply rooted in history. Russia (then the Soviet Union) became one of the first countries to recognize Bangladesh as an independent country. Since then our states have always maintained good and trusted relations as a secure foundation for further cooperation – including that in the nuclear field.

In order to create its own nuclear industry, it was necessary for Bangladesh to find a partner with vast

knowledge, practical knowhow and proven expertise in the field. There were other important issues like financial arrangements, selecting a fitting and safe technology, skilled manpower training, management of radioactive waste and spent fuel. Russia eagerly extended its friendly hand and offered Bangladesh a well-balanced and comprehensive solution.

Eventually, this cooperation came to fruition. Within only seven years since the start of construction works, a truly outstanding progress in the nuclear sphere has been made. As stated by the Rosatom State Corporation Director General Alexey Likhachev during his recent visit to Bangladesh, "the construction works on the first unit of Rooppur NPP are almost over, so we expect the unit to start pilot operation by the next year's end. The work on the second unit is in full swing too concrete works on the inner containment dome are finished. main circular pipeline has been welded ahead of schedule".

Safety has always been our utmost priority, right down the line. The flagship VVER-1200 reactors will stand in the heart of Rooppur NPP power units.



The Benefits of a Nuclear Power Plant

These reactors have proved their efficiency and reliability during operation at the reference Russian power plants. Today five such reactors are in place – four of them in Russia and one in the Republic of Belarus. Active construction of such reactors is also underway in Hungary, Egypt, Türkiye, China and, of course, Bangladesh.


VVER-1200 are generation III+ reactors, which comply with the latest post-Fukushima safety norms. That means, they have active and passive protection systems, which make NPP proof against both external and internal impacts. All modern Russian nuclear VVER-type reactors have the dome system (which is called containment) for the protection against extreme stress. Containment consists of an external wall of reinforced concrete and an internal protection dome - the latter ensures air-tightness and can endure the outside pressure caused by a 30 kPa explosion. In order to withstand it the containment is constructed with the use of a special 'pre-tensioned concrete' - the

metal rods are tightly strained inside the concrete cover so that the structure is more stable during earthquakes, for example.

One of the special technical protection feature of such type of reactors is a molten core catcher (or simply a 'core catcher'). This device is a 144-ton metal bell-shaped container, which in case of emergency keeps the molten core inside and does not let it go beyond the leak-proof walls of the reactor building. The core catcher is filled with special material that

helps the molten core lose some of the accumulated heat. The chemical processes emerging during such interaction create the conditions for the corium to stay and cool down. The device exhibits supreme safety features, e.g. the increased earthquake, hydrodynamic and crashworthy resistance.

All in all, one of the remarkable features of the modern VVER-type reactors is a truly unique safety system – a storage pool for spent nuclear fuel inside the leak-proof containment, filters on the exit areas of the inter-containment ventilated space, the molten core catcher and the unrivaled heat removal system. All these technical solutions allow us to consider the

VVER-1200 as the reactors of III+ generation.


In this context, it is noteworthy that the nuclear fuel for VVER-type reactors has its own safety system. In fact, it literally is the safety system in itself. Each uranium pellet is made of enriched uranium cooked in a special high temperature kiln – as a result, the pellet receives a protective ceramic cover. After that, all pellets are packed in airtight zirconium rods, which serve as the second layer of protection. Then all the rods are organized into fuel assemblies and placed inside the reactor the third protective layer.

This exact type of fuel was delivered to the first nuclear power plant in Bangladesh on October 5, 2023. The solemn Graduation Ceremony was attended by Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina and President Vladimir Putin, Minister Yeafesh Osman and Rosatom Director General Aleksei Likhachev. The dream of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman was coming true right before their eyes.

Media scarcely mentioned the fact that this particular batch of fuel for Rooppur NPP is a modernized one. Its lifespan has been increased from 12 up to 18

months, which is definitely going to contribute to the energy security of Bangladesh. Thus, it can be called a double achievement.

Moreover, around 1000 Bangladeshi specialists have been trained in Rosatom Technical Academy or other higher educational institutions and now are ready to start operating at the Rooppur NPP. As the Russian President noted during his speech at the Graduation Ceremony, "Russia is not merely building an NPP, we are supporting Bangladesh in establishing a brand new sector of economy". Rooppur NPP helps

to create thousands of workplaces for local people, dozens of Bangladeshi companies provide their services and materials for the construction works – apart from the electricity itself. According to Minister Yeafesh Osman, Rooppur NPP will become an impetus for the growth of the Northern regions increasing country's GDP at 2%. As we can see, the Rooppur NPP is going to provide safety and security in many ways.

All in all, in spite of the increased geopolitical instability, Russia is committed to further cooperation with Bangladesh in the field of peaceful atom. Keeping in mind the ongoing energy crisis, the atomic energy is a sustainable solution for Bangladesh, and Russia is ready to provide the full spectrum of nuclear technologies. Constructive cooperation between our two countries undoubtedly meets the interests of people in Russia and Bangladesh and contributes to regional stability and security. It is evident that the Rooppur NPP Project will ensure a brighter and safer – future of the Bangladeshi people.






BANGLADESH-KUWAIT DEFENSE COOPERATION



nations to further their narrow national interests. This selective approach, he noted, has contributed to eroding trust and solidarity among nations, creating one of the most critical crises of our time.

Foreign Minister Momen emphasized that, while Bangladesh values freedom of the media and free speech, it refrains from taking action against propaganda machines, as it believes in the wisdom and discernment of its people.

Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen has raised pertinent concerns at a seminar without explicitly naming any countries. He decried the exploitation of democracy and human rights as tools to advance narrow national interests by powerful nations. He

emphasized the erosion of trust and solidarity among nations due to this selective approach. Notably, certain Bangladeshis living abroad, sometimes supported by external groups, have played a role in propagating this agenda.

strengthened democratic institutions, and ensured economic and social well-being for the people.

In his insightful speech, Lt Gen Mohammad Mahfuzur Rahman, a retired military professional, delved into a range of global conflict situations and their security

implications. He highlighted key areas of tension, including the Ukraine-Russia conflict, the Israel-Palestine issue in the volatile Middle East, and geopolitical dynamics in the South China Sea. He also examined the rise of militant groups and power rivalries involving countries like NATO, Russia, China, and Iran.

The speech underscored the limits of autonomy for small states in geopolitics and offered valuable lessons. WORLD SIGHT DAY: BANGLADESH PUTS EYE HEALTH ON SPOTLIGHT AT THE UN

he United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) serves as an ideal platform for discussing and addressing global challenges, from poverty and climate change to sustainable development. Bangladesh Permanent Mission to the UN in New York has been co-leading the agenda on eye health with the Missions of Antigua and Barbuda and Ireland since 2018. It has actively participated in discussions on universal health coverage and sustainable development, emphasizing the critical role of eye health in achieving these goals. Bangladesh's representatives have not only highlighted the progress made within the

country but have also called for greater international cooperation to tackle eye health challenges on a global scale.

In a significant move, Bangladesh facilitated the first-ever resolution on eye health at the UNGA titled, 'Vision for Everyone: Accelerating Action to Achieve the Sustainable Development Goals' which was adopted unanimously on 23 July 2021 with co-sponsoring by 115 countries.

The significance of eye health Eve health is a fundamental component of overall well-being

and socioeconomic development. Vision impairment is a universal challenge that most people will experience in their lifetime. Avoidable vision impairment or blindness can be both a cause and a consequence of entrenched inequalities. Impaired vision can limit access to education, employment, and economic opportunities, perpetuating cycles of poverty in many regions of the world. More than 2 billion

people around the globe are either suffering from blindness or lower vision and 1.1 billion people have vision impairment that are avoidable through cost-effective treatment and prevention. Unfortunately, 90% of them live in low-income settings where access to quality eye care is scarce.

World Sight Day is a stark reminder of the importance of eye care. This year's theme- Love Your Eyes at Work- focuses on the importance of eye care at workplaces. The hope is that the awareness activities on this day will empower the workforce by enabling them to understand their health rights, as well as educating employers, governments and other stakeholders worldwide about the importance of sight.

Bangladesh's commitment to eye health

Avoidable blindness is one of the major public health problems in Bangladesh too. About 1% of people aged over 40 years are blind and millions more are suffering from refractive errors and low vision. Among them, 80% are cataract victims which is avoidable and treatable through simple and cost-effective surgical intervention.

Bangladesh has long been at the forefront of addressing eye

health challenges. It launched the national program for the prevention of visual impairment and blindness in 1980. A nationwide program was undertaken involving GO-NGO-private partnership for the prevention and control of blindness with special emphasis given for the control of childhood blindness. Later, as a signatory to the global initiative, 'Vision 2020', Bangladesh formulated a National Eye Care Program (NECP). As a result of its early action, the country has made remarkable progress in reducing blindness and visual impairment.

To further strengthen the ongoing efforts, the government of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina decided to integrate primary eye care in the portfolio of primary health care services by setting up community vision centres. It has so far established 135 community vision centers to cater free-of-cost eve care for the poor and marginalized people. The centers are equipped with basic eye care ability having trained nurses for this job supported by teleconsultation with ophthalmologists. These efforts have improved the quality of life

for millions of underserved populations through the provision of comprehensive eye care services.

Bangladesh's leadership at the UN

Bangladesh joined the UN Friends of Vision group formed on World Sight Day in 2018 and became a co-chair of the group. UN Friends of Vision continued to educate countries on the links between Vision and the SDGs and drive the integration of primary eye care into universal

health coverage. At Bangladesh's behest, the group organized, for the first time, a free eye screening camp at the UN secretariat for the delegates and the staff of the UN on World Sight Day, 2019. The camp was a huge success with an attendance of over 400 staff and delegates. It has been continuing since then on the occasion of the World Sight Day, except in 2020 and 2021 due to Covid-19 disruption.

Despite the fact that vision impairment and blindness is pervasive, the maldistribution of resources across the world and within borders, means that the experience of living with vision loss does, in fact, discriminate. This is a grim picture that calls for transformative action. And a first ever UN resolution on vision care finally dawned.

By championing this resolution, Bangladesh underscores the critical importance of a good vision for achieving sustainable development and socioeconomic progress. Bangladesh's

leadership in promoting eye health at the UNGA has yielded several important outcomes:

- 1. Increased global awareness: Bangladesh's efforts have contributed to raising global awareness about the importance of eye health and highlighted the urgency of addressing eye health as a global priority.
- 2. Resource mobilization: The initiative has encouraged IFIs and donors to allocate targeted finances toward addressing eye health for LMICs. It also urges the member states to mobilize domestic resources to contribute to global efforts to reach, by 2030, at least 1.1 billion people who have a vision impairment and currently do not have access to the eye care services that they

need.

- 3. Policy Advocacy: Bangladesh's advocacy has led to policy initiatives that aim to integrate eve health into broader healthcare and development agendas, e.g. reporting the status of eve care in country-led evaluation at the UN to assess progress towards achieving SDGs.
- 4. Knowledge and technology Sharing: It calls for capacity building by sharing knowledge on successful models and best practices. It encourages countries to replicate achievements in the field of eve health, particularly by transferring technology in eye care and assistive devices. 5. Collective action: This initiative paves the way for

collective action to build an international campaign on eve health towards the fulfilment of the SDGs and to leave no one behind by 2030.

The UNGA has proven to be an effective platform for Bangladesh to lead the charge on public health issues. Bangladesh's leadership of the Vision Care resolution is a pivotal step in putting the spotlight on eye health at the highest international level. Leveraging its experiences, successes, and commitments, Bangladesh has not only improved eye health within its borders but has also contributed to the global effort to combat preventable blindness and visual impairment. As the world continues to grapple with healthcare challenges, the actions taken by Bangladesh serve as a shining example of how a dedicated nation can make a significant global impact and guide others to prioritize and accelerate actions for the vision health as a vital component of the SDGs.

To celebrate Bangladesh's success, let us pledge on the 'World Sight Day' to learn best practices on distance from screens, take a break to exercise long and near distance vision, and maintain health and safety in dangerous environments where eyes can be damaged.

space, fueling a nation's aspirations and collective spirit.


The Eternal Symbol of Hope In a world marked by turbulence and change, Sheikh Russel remains a symbol of


